

World Championship Success!

We are thrilled to share some exciting news with you about Mr Wilson, who teaches P.E. at Bramfield Primary School (pictured holding the trophy below). Mr Wilson has recently achieved remarkable success as a world champion, and we couldn't be prouder of him!

Mr Wilson (pictured holding the trophy) was delighted to have been selected to represent GB in the Racketlon World Championships in Rotterdam.

For those unaware, Racketlon is where you play an opponent at TABLE TENNIS, BADMINTON, SQUASH, and then TENNIS, with each sport played to 21 points in the singles categories but playing up to 11 points in the teams' events. At this event there were over 430 competitors from over 30 countries. Mr Wilson's big intention this year was success in the Teams event, where he was selected for the GB team to play in the Nations Cup.

Facing Austria in the first match, Mr Wilson played alongside his captain for the doubles section, and despite losing the table tennis against opposition to specialises in that sport, they won the remaining sports. The 5 members of the team did enough collectively that they only needed 2 points in tennis to take the win.

Next up, an experienced Hungarian team and Mr Wilson were selected to play the lead singles. As Mr Wilson had expected he unfortunately lost the table tennis leg but stormed back to win the badminton & squash legs. His teammates did likewise, and the points that they had gained meant that tennis was not even needed.

With 2 great wins, tremendous team spirit, and lots of support meant, GB would face a very strong French team in the final. Mr Wilson played singles against a player who was much higher ranked than him, but with determination, Mr Wilsin and his team managed to secure the World Championship Gold

and the Nations Cup Trophy!

This success is a testament to the hard work, dedication, and exceptional talent of Mr. Wilson and his team. We invite you to join us in congratulating him on this incredible achievement.

We are extremely proud to have such an inspiring individual motivating our children in P.E. lessons.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about **CONSPIRACY THEORIES**

Conspiracy theories are false or misleading beliefs that explain events as secret plots, often involving powerful groups. While once fringe, they are now more accessible through digital media, online influencers and because of algorithmic recommendations. The DfE guidance document, 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) explicitly recognises conspiracy theories as potential content risks. This guide will help parents and educators understand the risks, spot the signs, and build children's resilience to conspiracy theories.

UNDERMINING TRUST

WHAT ARE

Conspiracy theories can lead children and young people to distrust democratic institutions and British Values, teachers, and even their own families and loved ones. This erosion of trust makes young people more vulnerable to extremist narratives by isolating them from reliable sources of information.

I WANT TO BELIE

GATEWAY TO

Conspiracy theories can often averlap with extremist ideologies. Narratives that blame specific groups, such as politicians, scientists, or particular ethnic groups, can groom children in ways that faster hate, bigotry, and radicalization.

CONFLICT WITH

Belief in conspiracy theories can lead to isolation or conflict at school. Children may struggle with peer relationships if they express these beliefs or become distrustful of others who disagree; sometimes, confrontation can even result in a strengthening of the belief in the conspiracy theory.

ERODED CRITICAL THINKING

Young people influenced by conspiracies may reject evidence-based learning. This risks undermining their academic progress and weakening their ability to think critically, assess

Advice for Parents & Educators

CREATE SAFE CONVERSATIONS

Don't mack or dismiss any questions that children and young people ask about conspiracy theories. Instead, create open, judgement-free spaces to talk. This strengthens trust and makes it more likely they will confide in you

PROMOTE CRITICAL THINKING

Teach young people how to assess information critically. Encourage them to ask appropriate questions, such as: Who is telling me this? What evidence is there? What do other trusted sources say? Use real examples from current media to explain your answers and reasoning.

MONITOR DIGITAL BEHAVIOUR

Be aware of the content children are accessing, especially on plotforms such as Tikfak, YouTube, or Reddit. Use parental controls, but more importantly, maintain angoing dialogue about online experiences and influencers.

REINFORCE RELIABLE SOURCES

Point children toward trustworthy and reliable sources of news and information in a variety of formats tailored to the young person's ag Build habits of verifying facts using reliable sources, and teach then how to spot misleading content.




